Creating Queer Legend & Legacy - is an invitation for you to participate in the creation of a Legacy Wall in-



side the Center on Colfax. Facilitated by award winning poet, end-of-life doula and multi-media artist Confidence Omenai, this eight-week workshop guides participants through writing, recording, and creating a self-portrait using collage that illustrates the legend they wish to leave. The unrelenting barbarity that stalks the intersections of queer communities creates an atmosphere of impermanence. This leaves many of us questioning how many

will rise or fall before dawn and if we will be remembered. We rarely know the day or hour of our demise. Creating Queer Legacy aims to give agency and allow us the opportunity to be immortalized while leaving a rich inheritance to our community.

This is a temporary-closed group. Once the 8-week program is completed the group will conclude. This art group is open to individuals 50 years and older and **you must be able to attend all 8 weeks.** Space is limited to 20 participants. Upon completion of the project, participants will have created an art piece & a recording of your story in

your own words for people to enjoy. The art will then be put on display at DenverPRIDE, hopefully on display in the community outside of The Center, will be the main exhibit of The Center's Holiday Art show and Party, and lastly hung on the walls of The Center for visitors to see.

<u>About Confidence, the classes instructor</u>—Confidence Omenai is a queer Nigerian American multi-hyphenate creative, entrepreneur, end of life doula, mother of five, and breaker of chains. Her work explores cycles of death, rebirth, systemic oppression, martyrdom on the altar of motherhood and marriage. As the CEO of Only Confidence Inc. for the last 16 years, she's created curriculum, facilitated writing workshops, and

also specializes in program development, grant writing, and encouraging radical self-interrogation around the country at universities, high schools, middle schools, maximum security prisons, juvenile facilities and more. She is a TEDx MileHigh Performer and Host, Pink Door Fellow, and Oklahoma State University Alum. Her work appears in A La Palabra: The Word is a Woman: Mothers & Daughters, Listen to Your Skin Queer Anthology and "Did You Die Though?' her debut mixed media art installation at The Leon Gallery. Confidence currently resides in Denver, creating transformative work across genres, crafting indigenous medicine, calling on the Ancestors and clearing the way for her rebellious great granddaughters, who will defend the earth in her name.

<u>Saying good bye</u>— Accepting social work interns is one of the highlights of my job. Beyond being able to prac-



tice social work with a focus on program development, leadership, and group work—all were in my area of study. I choose to bring on social work interns because I believe it's important to give back to the profession. My goal is to provide a field placement that is creative, innovative, and fun. The hardest part of the field experience is when we go through what is called *termination*. The goal of Termination is for the consumer to not feel abandoned, as well as the clinician knowing we have been able to do our

job effectively and assisted in aiding the client in achieving and/or developing the skills they need to move forward in life.

Like all internships they must conclude and that time has come for Zac and Scarlet. The pair's last week will be in early May and over the next serval weeks they will start to talk about termination, and should you need them to, they will process with you. For some of you it will not be a big deal and for others this will have an impact.—That is okay. For me, I am sad and don't want them to go. To say thank you and celebrate their hard work the pair will be hosting a **Lunch & Learn on Tuesday, May 2nd Start time 11:45 am—1p** RSVP with Jason or Bryant.

## -Queer Woke

Join West of 50 as we welcome two-time silver medalist from USA National Paratriathlon Team Hailey Danz and Kyle Stepp, an Elite Paratriathlete. The pair will unpack their stories and share how they bonded over the sport of triathlon and discovered how remarkably similar their stories were. As survivors of the same type of childhood cancer and the same level of amputation, the duo found triathlon to be a place for purpose and healing.

As openly gay elite athletes with a disability, Hailey and Kyle have faced unique challenges and are advocating for greater LGBTQ+ inclusion in sports. Despite facing numerous obstacles in the competitive world of

sports, Hailey and Kyle have never let their disability or sexuality define them or limit their ambitions. Together they have shown that disability and sexuality are not barriers to success but rather sources of strength and resilience.

During the event, you will hear firsthand how Hailey and Kyle have navigated their unique intersectionality and learn about their work to build inclusion and access for the LGBTQ+ and disabled communities in elite sports.

### **Hailey Danz**

Hailey Danz was diagnosed with bone cancer at the

age of 12, and underwent an elective above-knee amputation at 14. While interning at an adaptive sports nonprofit in college, she discovered the sport of triathlon. She quickly fell in love with the community surrounding the sport and never looked back.

Hailey went on to represent USA in paratriathlon at the 2016 and 2020 Paralympics, and earned a silver medal at both Games. She is currently based in Colorado Springs, where she is training for the 2024 Paralympics. As an openly gay woman with a physical disability, Hailey is passionate about making sport more accessible and inclusive for all.

Kyle Stepp is an openly gay, internationally ranked elite para-triathlete, community leader, and activist for equitable healthcare, disability rights, and LGBTQIA+ communities. After growing up in foster



care, surviving stage four cancer at 14, and overcoming the challenges of being an

amputee after losing his left leg less than two years ago after a downhill mountain bike accident – he made it his personal mission to use those unfortunate circumstances to help others facing the same hardships. He's often pursuing his passion for international para-triathlon competition, cycling for cancer research & disability rights, rock climbing new routes, advocating for important legislation, or shredding the slopes of the Rockies on a beautiful powder day.
